Background

The protection of cultural heritage is indissolubly linked to increasing the resilience of disaster-prone communities. Being an invaluable source of identity and evolution of a society, cultural heritage is a vital catalyst for social cohesion and development. Therefore, addressing adequate measures toward its preservation and protection from natural and human-made hazards is essential to ensure sustainable development processes and effective disaster management operations. From a civil protection perspective, this can be translated into the inclusion of the protection of cultural heritage in all the phases of disaster risk management (DRM) cycle. Therefore, in line with the *Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (2015-2030)*¹, the definition of cross-sectoral cooperation and synergies should be envisaged at each territorial level to ensure the necessary assumption of responsibilities in the definition of coordinated and effective actions to reduce the vulnerability of cultural heritage at risk.

In this sense, the PROCULTHER project- *Protecting Cultural Heritage from the Consequences of Disasters*, by pooling together the experience and competences of [Italy](#), [France](#), [Spain](#), [Turkey](#), [ICCROM](#), [Villa Montesca](#) and with the collaboration of [UNESCO](#) (Regional Bureau for Science and Culture in Europe), aims at contributing to the development of common European rules, shared procedures and operating standards to improve the safeguard of cultural heritage at risk of disaster by promoting a structured cooperation among cultural heritage and Civil protection actors at local, national and European level and the establishment of capacities able to support in a coordinated and effective way disaster management operations.

In particular, the project, implemented within the framework of a [European Union Civil Protection Mechanism](#) (UCPM) initiative and co-funded by the [Directorate-General for European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations](#) (DG-ECHO), is intended to sustain and complement the efforts made by the European Union in strengthening cooperation between EU Members and 6 Participating States (Iceland, Norway, Serbia, North Macedonia, Montenegro, and Turkey) in the field of civil protection. The UCPM plays a crucial role in providing for common standards enabling certified and well-equipped teams to work interchangeably in supporting Countries overwhelmed by the impact of disaster. Since its creation in 2001, the UCPM has responded to more than 420 requests for assistance inside and outside the European Union², some of which also related to the protection of cultural heritage. However, at this stage, the UCPM does not include any module³, requiring registration by EU member States/Participating States, dedicated to protecting cultural heritage at risk of disaster and procedures should be identified to allow interoperability among existing UCPM modules in view of joint operations in Europe and at international level.

Under this framework, the PROCULTHER project is promoting the development of technical and operational capacities to reinforce cultural heritage protection in emergency as well as to enable the effective activation and deployment of an interdisciplinary UCPM driven module able to support requesting Countries or interested International Organisations in the protection of disaster-prone or affected cultural heritage assets.

Key Elements of a European Methodology to Address the Protection of Cultural Heritage during Emergencies

To reach the objective of building technical and operational capacities for the protection of cultural heritage at risk of disaster at European level, as a first step the project promoted a process of capitalization on the capacities, resources and practices that the PROCULTHER project partners can deploy in case of emergency to protect cultural heritage at risk. The scaling-up process, conducted in the early phases of the project, served as a basis to define the first draft of the document “**Key Elements of a European Methodology to Address the Protection of Cultural Heritage during Emergencies**”.

The objective of this document is to provide key operational and technical elements to advance preparedness and response activities to include cultural heritage safeguard in all the phases of the disaster risk management cycle at European level. In this sense, the contents are built on lessons learnt and best practices identified in the Countries members of the PROCULTHER consortium with the aim of developing a common and shared understanding of the subject at European level. The participatory approach, ensured throughout the elaboration phase, has allowed to highlight strengths and weaknesses of the national DRM systems currently in place and to identify margins of improvement to better advocate for a holistic and coordinated approach. In this sense, in order to build effective capacities in this field, the project has further explored many structural, technical and operational aspects on how to enhance the protection of cultural heritage at risk of disaster at each territorial level.

It is also worth mentioning that the document does not claim to thoroughly cover all issues related to the protection of cultural heritage but it proposes methods, languages, rules resulting from learning and capitalisation processes launched in the Countries involved in the project.

In particular, the document proposes and deepens the following issues:

- **Institutional framework:** this chapter focuses on main international regulatory and operational frameworks, actors to be involved and roles, elements for strengthening a cultural heritage governance both at national and European level.
- **Planning the inclusion of cultural heritage in all the phases of DRM:** this chapter provides strategic methodological and operational inputs for the inclusion of cultural heritage in disaster risk management planning processes. It also includes an outline to guide the development of cultural heritage sector plan and site security plans. In addition, key operational planning elements are presented to define priorities for the protection/extraction/removal of cultural heritage in emergency, to identify and organize adequate storages for movable assets and to adapt early warning systems to the sector’s needs.

- **Coordination structure:** this chapter emphasizes the role that a coordinated structure can have within an operational centre in improving disaster risk management capacities.
- **Teams:** this chapter addresses issues related to the establishment of objectives, rules and procedures of a team, to be converted in a Module/Other Response capacities within the UCPM framework, to ensure the safeguard of cultural heritage at European and international level in case of emergency.
- **Tools and data management systems:** this chapter proposes reporting tools for risk and need assessments, as well as the definition of IT systems for sharing data and information to improve operational capacities.
- **Training:** this chapter deals with the definition of training standards to be possibly included under the learning structures of the UCPM, in order to strengthen and test capacities in this field.
- **Exercises:** this chapter advocates on the importance of testing capacities to improve the safeguard of cultural heritage at risk of disaster. It proposes an outline to facilitate the organization of cultural heritage full-scale exercises and a list of materials that can serve for the preparation of the scenario.
- **Conclusion and recommendations:** in this conclusive part a comprehensive overview of the actions to be undertaken at each territorial level is addressed.

In order to consolidate a European perspective on the methodological and operational issues needed at European and international level to serve the protection of cultural heritage at risk of disaster, the PROCULTHER project has planned to invite all interested Countries and International Organizations to participate in an International Workshop to contribute with their own experience and practice to the further development and revision of the document.

Defining European Technical and Operational Capacities for the Protection of Cultural Heritage at Risk of Disaster: a two-day international workshop

With the aim of strengthening a European approach toward the protection of cultural heritage by giving prominence to all the practices that have proven to be effective in DRM processes so as to allow a wider contribution to the development and revision of the document “Key Elements of a European Methodology to Address the Protection of Cultural Heritage during Emergencies” (hereinafter denominated ‘methodological document’), the PROCULTHER project envisages the organization of a two-day international workshop during which interested Countries and International Organisations can contribute to the identification of key methodological elements to address cultural heritage protection issues through their own perspective and practice. In this sense, the international workshop will provide for a space of discussion to revise the elements currently proposed by the PROCULTHER project, as well as to discuss the inclusion of other practices that can enrich and make more effective a European DRM approach to reinforce Cultural heritage protection.

Due to the European focus of the project, the international workshop is particularly addressed to EU Member States and UCPM participating States and International Organisations, interested to contribute to the processes undertaken by the PROCULTHER project. Nevertheless, the workshop will also be open to non-European countries and concerned actors with relevant practice in the development of methods/tools in this field or simply willing to be part of the event's objectives.

There are no registration fees or other charges for this event. Interested workshop attendees should register online before the deadline of 30 May 2021. The registration form will also include a questionnaire that will serve to identify any practice that can feed the process of building technical and operational capacities at European level in the field of Cultural heritage protection and to confirm interest of the attendees to participate in the processes undertaken by the PROCULTHER project.

The event will be streamed live, so participation will also be possible for those non-registered who will be able to interact with participants through the messaging services provided by the video-conference platform.

The agenda of the event has been conceived to cover the two objectives foreseen by the international workshop: 1) pooling of extra-project practices that can feed the revision of the methodological document, 2) revision of the first consolidated draft of the methodological document.

During the **first day of the workshop**, extra-project case studies will be presented so as to have more elements for the discussion on the revision of the methodological document. In particular these will focus on the chapters of the methodological document, namely Institutional framework, Planning the inclusion of Cultural Heritage in all the phases of DRM, Coordinated structure, Teams, Tools and Data management systems, Training and Exercises.

On the **second day**, the issues addressed during the first day will be capitalised and presented in order to provide a basis for the discussion among all participants on the contents of the methodological document. Six separate working sessions will be dedicated to the discussion of the chapters of the methodological document. In order to gain valuable insights from the audience in a timely and effective manner, comments and suggestions from the session will be further investigated and systematized through a SLIDO questionnaire that will allow quantifying and qualifying, for each session, the general agreement on the revisions proposed by the actors participating in the workshop.

- **Consolidated approach and ownership:** the practice is based on consolidated in-field performances and grounded at each territorial level.
- **Innovation:** the practice addresses innovative useful methods/tools to include the protection of cultural heritage throughout the DRM phases and contains elements to reinforce climate change adaptation, DRR-oriented land management, private-public partnership, etc.
